## Pi Brothers Work Diligently To Attract Rushees

I know it's been quite a while since you've experienced the thrill of a Sunday afternoon smoker or a Monday night rush dinner, but I just thought I'd let you know how things are going this year in the Pi-house in terms of rush. For starters, there have been some drastic changes made regarding the policies of fraternity rush in the last few years, the most crippling of which has been the new policy of a dry rush. The drinking age has been changed to 21 in New York, making three-quarters of the students at Cornell under the legal drinking age. Whereas three years ago most freshmen were able to drink legally, now most students are not of age until their second semester, junior year, or even senior year. As a result, the fraternal system has adopted the state's policy regarding the consumption of alcohol, and fraternities are now expected not only to check for proof of age at all parties, but also to be sure that alcohol (yes, even beer) is not allowed to be served to any rushees.

What all of this means is that I am constantly looking for new ways to attract freshmen to Sigma Pi. Although the Pi-house is not one of those houses that attracts new members by its physical structure, our neophyte class has been working hard all year to get the house in shape for rush. More importantly, however, we have been working to show the freshmen that the brotherhood of Sigma Pi is a strong one. We have had a large number of members attend our smokers, dinners, and other rush events.

For our first smoker, we had just under 100 freshmen and sophomores show up to take a tour of the house. As usual, "bobs" and soda helped to make the afternoon go by quickly. The very next day, we had our first rush event, Monday Night Football (scabs of course). Rush dinners started the week after the first smoker, and Dolly is keeping busy cooking for 60 brothers and 20 rushees every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday night.

In the next few months I have many events scheduled such as bowling at Ides with Pi Phi sorority, tailgates, and, of course, "booey mongers." By our second smoker we intend to have around 250 rushees to look at. From this group we hope to obtain at least 25-30 pledges. I know there are at least that many potential Pi-men out there; in a few months we'll know for sure.

## **Chapter Strives For Stable Ground**

As you may or may not already know, our financial position is not very stable. This, however, is not due to our own current accounts receivable, but to a couple of other factors. Our current bills, with a few exceptions, are being fully paid. However, this just isn't enough money to cover all of our expenses. Currently, there are only 67 active members in the Mu Chapter. There is simply no way that we can put the burden of major improvements on these 67 people. We are able to keep the house running in decent financial shape, but the physical condition of the house, basically due to time, needs care.

I informed many of you this summer that by collecting old alumni accounts receivable we would be in much better shape. In case many of you were not aware over the summer I sent out letters to over 40 alumni who have outstanding bills totaling over \$30,000. With this money alone, we would be able to conduct significant repairs to the house. Following the mailing of this letter we heard from about 30 per cent of this group.

We are going to call all of the alumni from whom we have not heard. This process will cost the house even more money, so we ask those alumni to contact us so that the situation can be resolved. If, after this procedure, there is still a significant amount of money out there, we will be forced to turn to a credit collection agency. We sincerely hope that we aren't forced to this action, but the house has troubles, and we feel that it is important to solve them.

It was only four years ago that the house almost went under. We have fought our way back to shaky ground, but our goal is to gain stable, if not prosperous, ground. We are trying to increase the membership and better our maintenance procedures. We ask that you do your part and pay any outstanding bills or make a donation, and we thank you if you already have. Every little bit helps.
