A Message From Tom Owens '83

Brothers,

I tried to get down to Homecoming this weekend (flew over yesterday three times and got a few tactical pictures of the Pi house porch), [but] it is drill and impossible. Things have been very hectic up here: got back from Iraq on the 10th, scrambled on the PA hijacked jet on the 11th, spent six hours patrolling over Pittsburgh and three hours over Manhattan the 12th chasing down anything that flew. We are getting ready to do whatever the country needs us to. I still have not unpacked from my recent trip to Southwest Asia.
