Alumni Treasurer Report

Let me start with a nod to normalcy, something that has been rare over the last two years. The fraternity is current on all bills and likely to remain so in

the short term. I am able to say this in large part due to the expanded team we now have and an amazing amount of work and attention to detail. Some thank-yous are in order.

First, Ricky Melasecca '24 (sage) and Matt Chin '25 (undergraduate treasurer) have been instrumental in keeping the issue of timely bill payment high on the list of brotherhood duties. Where necessary, they have been having the difficult conversations to get each brother in arrears to take ownership for their situation and to seek help from any and all sources. It has been an absolute pleasure to work alongside them to dramatically reduce the past due amounts from undergraduate brothers.

Next, Aron Minken '80, recently retired from PWC after a long and very successful consulting career, has stepped up to become an advisor to the undergraduate treasurer, focused not just on the collection of receivables but on the more proactive work of cash forecasting and accurate expenditure budgets. Aron has already developed a tool that allows Matt Chin '25 to stay on top of critical metrics and in a position to report to the brotherhood on the financial shape of the house at every house meeting.

Zack Cockerham, our account partner at Elevate (our "back office" partner), has institutionalized the A/R record and chairs a semimonthly Zoom session that keeps us focused on many moving targets. Angie Mansi from CSL continues to contact undergraduate brothers and alumni (and in many cases

their parents) in an attempt to keep debts owed to Sigma Pi top of mind. Angie is the last "friendly" step before we roll over to hard collections.

Tim Hawes '82 has also joined our finance committee to lend his expertise with contract review and strategies that will help the undergraduate and alumni chapters reduce their spending. And of course, we have the full attention of Jarett Wait '80, Steve Pirozzi '80, and Liviu Rusu '98 as we build the systems needed to manage the substantial risk that Cornell shifted to the fraternity system when it terminated our access to Cornell billing through the university bursar system.

I'm sure I am missing people on this list, but those are the major players. A sincere thank you to each.

I would be remiss not to point out the way that the Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi Educational Foundation, under the guidance of Joe Zanetta '75, has stepped up to also help us navigate these financial challenges. As the demographics of the university have changed, one of the fastest growing areas has been "fist generation" college students. Mu Chapter has always been a very diverse collection of young men, and the number of first generation students in Sigma Pi reflects the growing number in the larger campus population. While many of these young men are able to find the resources to pay tuition, room, and board, some are not. The foundation has developed an award to directly help those in need. Your tax-deductible contributions to the Educational Foundation (musigmapifoundation.org/donate/) might very well help a deserving young man enjoy the lifelong benefits of fraternity life at Cornell.

Let me close with a little history. The house was rebuilt after the fire in 1994. Thirty years is the outside useful life for many building components and features. Through your generous support and massive contributions of labor and expertise by Liviu Rusu, we have been able to replace the main roof and the flat roof membranes on the front porch and on the beach, upgrade the safety and the appearance of the beach "decking," replace all the windows on the third floor and in the Memorial Library and any other windows throughout the house that were failing: all this in addition to routinely replacing furniture and pool tables and light bulbs! But, the five boilers in the house are original to the new building, which makes them 30 years old and grossly inefficient by contemporary standards. We are fortunate to still be able to obtain replacement parts, but the boilers need to be replaced.

As we dig out of the bursar transition mess, my sights are focused on developing a plan to pay for a high-efficiency boiler each year out of rent proceeds. To do so, we need to steadily increase the number of brothers living in the house, minimize our unplanned expenses, and hope that no other deferred maintenance item takes precedent. As always, however, your support through gifts to the house corporation (not tax deductible) will help us accumulate the funds much sooner than we will be able to without your help. If you have not contributed in a while (many did not as COVID changed everything), now would be a good time!

Its 50 degrees and raining here in Aurora, so spring must be coming. If you find yourself headed to Ithaca as the weather gets better, please contact me (jjh56@cornell.edu). I'd be happy to show you around the house and introduce you to some of your brothers. I look forward to seeing many of you for the reunion blowout, featuring the amazing Band of Brothers in June.

Investing in the Future of the Brotherhood

The Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi Educational Foundation, in collaboration with the undergraduate chapter, recently established the Greek Affordability Fund on Dolly Day, September 9, 2022. Since its inception, the fund has raised over \$110,000 in pledges and direct contributions from dedicated alumni who recognize the need for financial support for brothers facing rising college tuition costs and inflation. The fund has now expanded to provide financial assistance to new members, covering initial fraternity costs and supporting brothers living in the chapter house. Thus far, the fund has assisted six recipients with \$34,000 in support. Three of these members currently reside in the chapter house and hold leadership positions, while the remaining three were new members who would not have been able to join the chapter without the support of the fund. The alumni board has observed a positive shift in the organization's culture since the fund's implementation, as it has provided much needed support to current brothers and has enabled the chapter to attract individuals who share Sigma Pi's values but might have struggled with the initial costs of joining.

The foundation has made significant

they relate to attending Cornell and your son being an undergraduate member of Sigma Pi. The university recently announced a **4.4% increase in tuition**. The fraternity's insurance underwriter recently notified us of increases to our policies with property insurance (+14%), liability insurance (+56%), and umbrella insurance (+167%). Regarding room cost, Sigma Pi benchmarks its room rate to be priced off Cornell dorm-room rates and is cheaper than Collegetown options. Similarly, the Sigma Pi meal plan is also benchmarked off Cornell's meal plan program.

This year, the alumni board announced to the brotherhood that rising seniors who decide to live in the fraternity-traditionally, many seniors opt to live in Collegetown-will be given a **20% discount** for a single room and a **25% discount** for a double room. If a rising senior is elected to sage (undergraduate president of the fraternity) they will live in the house for free. The simple math underlying the business model for the fraternity is the more brothers that live in, the more revenue is generated to cover routine maintenance, repairs, and upgrades. For whatever reason, over the last number of years, undergraduates have preferred living in single rooms, which does not help reduce overall costs.

With increasing costs and inflation impacting tuition and expenses, Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi continues to work very hard in making fraternity life affordable for all who are interested. Through the generosity of our alumni, the Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi Educational Foundation launched the Greek Affordability Fund. The Greek Affordability Fund provides grants that aim to help new members and brothers living in the house offset the costs of being in a fraternity. Grants this year awarded so far have totaled \$34,000 to six recipients. In addition, we would like to highlight the following awards, scholarships, or ways that your son might be able to find additional funding for expenses.

Mu Chapter also offers scholarships and prizes available to undergraduate members, including

the **David Harrop Memorial Scholarship**, an annual scholarship of **\$1,000**, awarded to the brother who best demonstrates academic excellence and service to the organization,

The Class of **'1980 Adolphus C. Hail**stork Brother of the Year Award, an award given to a senior class member in recognition of their contributions to the fraternity, and

Mu Chapter Educational Foundation internship position.

Sigma Pi International (SPI oversees all Sigma Pi chapters across the country) also has several scholarships awards available to Sigma Pi undergraduates. For further information, visit sigmapi.org/foundations/scholarships.

We would encourage you to speak with your son regarding these various options, and we are happy to answer any questions that you might have. We hope you will be able to attend Parent's Weekend.

Sigma Pi Launches New Brotherhood Agreement



In Memoriam: Remembering Rick Fish '72

Rick Fish died on March 11 in a biking accident near his home in Raleigh, North Carolina.

Remember his well-worn, mid-'60s maroon Mustang? Pinned to the visor above the driver's seat was a button that read "If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem."

Rick lived his life as a teacher, a mentor, a tutor, and an advocate, always focused on lifting others. Part of the solution.

Remember when he was social chair? He wasn't at Cornell to party, yet he made it easy for us. Big things like Hurlothrumbo and Rock 'n' Roll Tea, and regular live music weekend events were routine in those days.

He was at Cornell to get an education, and he got it. Doors opened for additional learning and work at Rutgers (MS), Tennessee (DVM and PhD), LSU New Orleans (post-doc and university vet) . . . taking him

ultimately in 1999 to the esteemed North Carolina State University College of Veterinarv Medicine, where he served as director of lab animal resources until his retirement in 2018.

Rick Fish: the barbecue grill master, the microbrew aficionado, the physical fitness buff, the accomplished sailor. He and wife Peg Hogan would often sail Mugsy, their 34' Beneteau, out of Oriental, North Carolina, into Pamlico Sound. Go ahead, Rick, sail on.


This will be my last semester as resident advisor, but it has been an honor. I believe that the strong leadership and culture in place means that whoever follows will have similar success.

Alumni Facilities Committee & Undergraduates Partner To Make Needed Enhancements to the House

Over the course of winter break, our younger brothers wore me out, trying to stay simultaneously a step ahead and a step behind them. In all, I tallied 170 hours, and the boys way more. But, it was worth it.

The good news: the house looks amazing. **Rob De Jesus '24** and **Ricardo Melasseca '24** are my heroes. Four of the guys learned the basic electrical skills of changing fixtures and outlets. Twelve or so guys have learned the basics of plas-

tering and painting. Everyone has learned to take more pride in our house.

The hallway closets on the second and third floors have been cleaned out. Both were full of closet doors, AC units, paint, desks, and trash.

We removed graffiti from the door of room 208.

The second-floor toilet has been reinstalled and is now fully functional.

The first-floor bathroom ceiling has been closed and plastered.

The first-floor hallway has been plastered, sanded, and painted (Behr Scuff Defense in "Roman Plaster," aka beige).

The first-floor hallway has brown carpet runner (only \$98, I won't cry if it doesn't last).

In the entry, we repaired ceiling tape marks around the heat detector, changed overhead bulbs to LED BR40 (proper size for fixture), relamped sconces to LED, and removed ballasts and rearranged the furniture and rugs.

The front door has a new doormat and a remounted keypad and the postmaster box has been fixed.

In the east lounge, we opened locked glass cabinets and rearranged the contents and resealed them. We also shifted the furniture, photos, and composites in the room, as well as purchased two matching table lamps and shades. The glass case on the right is visible from the entry foyer, so I chose it as the one that tells our story in three stages: founding charter, burning down and rising from the ashes, to outer space.

I mounted the space picture, high and angled to create the same viewpoint for the observer as the cameraman. It also didn't fit otherwise, and the other two items I can't alter.

In the foyer, we relamped the sconces, replaced overhead bulbs, cleaned the run, replaced the antiskid mats, and shifted the tables and music system.

In the west lounge, the piano is now gone. We cleaned the stains off the ceiling, vacuumed all cobwebs, fixed the chandeliers, found and moved all good leather furniture, and fixed three tables lamps and bought them matching shades. It makes such a difference to the atmosphere of the room.

The memorial library was the big surprise. The far wall with the tech center had some bubbling paint, which turned out to hide some long-term water damage from the old beach membrane. I removed the compromised portions, treated with mold control, and plastered with setting plaster for strength. But with each iteration of plater, more paper would bubble further out, so this is a temporary solution, and we'll need to change that piece of sheetrock in the summer. It has all been painted with matching green.

Also, the two wall sconces have been relamped to LEDs, so no more humming, and the lights have been changed to BR40 LEDs. I would have liked to add a dimmer but couldn't find it in brown.

The furniture layout has also been optimized to have the conference room table at the widest point, at the end, and the four chair group at the narrowest, in the middle.

The pool room has a new pool table in green, which looks perfect with the lights and walls. Out of the three wide seating stools, which were all broken, I managed to salvage components from one to repair the other two. New composites hang throughout; they were in the closet, which has been cleaned out.

In room 101, **Lucas McCallum '25**, one of our new sophomores, came in early and learned quite a lot. And, he has one of the coolest rooms in the house to show for it.

Noteworthy: **Max Kanders '24** came to help with set-up and rush before he departed for his semester in Amsterdam...and he worked hard!

The stairs from the foyer to the dining room have been half painted; as in, we taped a line at the 82-inch height of the doors and painted below it: for both looks and lack of time.

In the pit, all walls have been plastered, sanded, and painted purple. Furniture has been rearranged, with all gym equipment found around the house. Worn leather couches have been moved to the front-facing the wall to make a game room set up. Behind the door, there was a hole in the wall with the magnetic door holder inside. I cut out the sheetrock and replaced with plywood so we won't be fixing the same problem again. The old air vent was bent shut; I removed and replaced with a new vent that doesn't close.

The grotto has been cleared and cleaned and is now arranged as a card room with a card table built as a pledge project two years ago (formerly in the east lounge).

The social closet has been cleared, cleaned, and organized. We did not get to address the camera system, now that it is accessible, whereas I couldn't even open the door to the room before.

The three closets in the basement hallway have been organized, cleaned out, and will now be used for Pristine Cleaning so they can store cleaning tools on site. The house manager's closet has been partially cleared but still needs about two hours worth of work.

The backyard has been cleared, muddy spots have been filled with gravel, and the shed has been rearranged.

The beach had several posts installed to support party lights.

In the dining room, we repaired ceiling water damage.

The grab-and-go has been rearranged to have all necessary items properly displayed, and we replaced the missing cable box cover on the wall. The table tops have also been sanded and refinished.

We installed two solar-powered motionsensing lights on the stair to the parking lot to make the area safer at night. The stair railings near the front door and from the parking lot to the front of the house have been loose and held in place with temporary wooden braces for about a year. Permanent repairs are being completed as this goes to press.

In all, nine dumpsters of trash were removed, and the house is better for it. My goal was to prepare the house for rush and to foster ownership in the brotherhood. I'm quite happy with the results, and I'm proud of our younger brothers. Having seen how they came together the last few days, I think they'll do great this rush.
