# An Update Regarding COVID-19 and Mu Chapter

## Educational Foundation Launches \$25,000 Undergraduate Sponsor Campaign

ear Brothers of Sigma Pi Mu Chapter, We hope this note finds you and your loved ones healthy and safe.

As many of you know, the Mu Chapter Alumni Corporation closed the chapter house for the remainder of the spring semester in keeping with Cornell's policy requiring students to leave campus and return to their permanent residences to complete their courses online. The undergraduate brothers moved out the week of March 16.

Among the brotherhood, there are individuals who have already been affected by this rampant virus in some way, shape, or form. Unfortunately, there will likely be more. In response, the Education Foundation is doing what we can to help the undergraduate brothers in a time of uncertainty. We recently polled active members to find out how we can help, and the results were startling. At least six brothers to date have lost their summer or full-time employment offers, and more than 30 are still looking for opportunities. Many of these brothers were in the final rounds of interviewing when the crisis escalated.

These employment opportunities are a significant supplement to our undergraduate brothers' education. The Educational Foundation has launched a special \$25,000 campaign to help the Mu Chapter brotherhood. The sponsorship opportunities from the fund will be determined based on the funds received, but overall they will support

activities such as sponsoring brothers in unpaid internships, covering the relocation costs for brothers struggling to afford to start a new internship, and other initiatives as the Foundation finds the best ways to help.

The campaign has nearly reached our goal of \$25,000. The members of the Foundation Board of Directors began the fundraising with a \$5,000 challenge to the alumni. Young alumni made gifts via a GoFundMe page; others sent in checks. Many alumni made their gifts through Family Foundations and Donor Advised Funds. The important thing is that the brothers of Sigma Pi responded to a need. Although we planned to close the campaign on June 30, we are continuing to accept gifts. The foundation has been fortunate to provide stipends for brothers in need—those whose summer internships and jobs were interrupted by the Covid virus.

I learned the "art" of fundraising while giving tours as an undergrad at Cornell. The Campus Tour Service had daily tours of the beautiful Cornell campus, and it soon became obvious that the campus was the recipient of gifts from alumni and friends of the University. In fact, Cornell was established as a result of a gift—a gift of Ezra Cornell's farm and bequest of \$500K. As a result, he founded "an institution where any person can find instruction in any study."

When you stand on the patio of the Pi House on University Avenue, your gaze is focused on several huge gothic structures—Willard Straight Hall, Uris Library, and Myron Taylor Hall just to name a few. They were all made possible by generous benefactors. Many of us received scholarships; we ate meals and studied in libraries funded by alumni gifts. We listened to the beautiful chimes from McGraw Tower, a gift in honor of Jennie.

This year, we received gifts from 50 generous alumni and friends totaling more than \$25,000. This marks a dramatic increase in private support from the previous year, and for that, I am grateful. We launched a mini-campaign to seek funds from alumni to support current brothers whose summer plans were disrupted by Covid-19. We provided stipends to seven young men. In addition, we continued the tradition of funding two current undergraduate brothers to assist the foundation and house in outreach to alumni.

The foundation is excited to welcome **Peter Muth '74**, **Craig Dewey '06**, **Alex Eacker '15**, and **Nick Wint '15** as new members of the board of directors. Their enthusiasm and dedication to our chapter are great assets to the organization. **Bert Harrop '61**, our founding patron, is becoming a director emeritus. Sandy True, after six years of exceptional service to our chapter and College Mentors for Kids, will be stepping down from the board.

We shall continue to navigate the turbulent waters created by the national pandemic and the resulting economic downtown. Philanthropy—love of mankind—will continue to play an important role in the Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi. I would like to extend my thanks to the members of the board of directors of the foundation and particularly the officers: Vice Chairman Wayne Forman '80, Secretary Jim Franz '77, and Treasurer Connor Riser '16. 

he past six months have been undeniably difficult for the United States on many fronts, which is why the Educational Foundation is even more grateful for the many gifts made by our brothers and friends this year. The dedication of our alumni to help their younger brothers is both incredible and admirable. We have received 63 donations totaling \$25,891 from 50 brothers and friends of Mu Chapter during this fiscal year. As of June 30, 2020, the Foundation's entire portfolio's value is \$52,979, which contains \$8,979 in the operating account and \$44,000 in the investment portfolio. This year the foundation spent \$38,884 toward its many initiatives.

The investment portfolio returned 3.08% for the 2020 fiscal year versus 7.49% for the S&P 500 and 4.72% for MSCI EAFE (International). Over the past year, the managers performed in line with their respective benchmarks. During the global market decline in the first quarter of 2020, AB Growth, Yacktman, and Harbor protected capital better than the index-based ETFs.

With the help of our wonderful donors this year, the Foundation has been able to:

- Purchase plaques for the newly named **James H. Keene III '57** Memorial Library.
- Provide seven grants to brothers who were directly affected by, or took unpaid internships due to complications from COVID-19.
- Sponsor three attendees at the Sigma Pi Mid-Year Leadership Conference in Kansas City, Mo.
- Purchase digital headshots for the entire undergraduate brotherhood.
- Fund two house intern positions focused on Career Services and supporting the Educational Foundation community activities for Sackett Terry '21 and Will Nuga '21.
- Award our annual David Harrop Memorial Scholarship to Chris Cavanaugh '21.
- Sponsor six attendees at The New York Times DealBook Conference in New York City hosted by Andrew Ross Sorkin '99
- Provide access to online studying and collaboration tools for undergraduate brothers.
- Donate to the active chapter's No Kid Hungry fundraiser.

Before the switch to virtual learning this semester, the Foundation was pleased to see how much the Learning Commons had truly become an educational hub for the undergraduate brothers. The chapter house is now able to provide not only a fantastic social atmosphere, but a deeply educational one as well.

The Educational Foundation thanks all those who have supported our endeavors. None of these activities could have taken place without the generosity of our brotherhood and the greater Mu Chapter alumni community. We look forward to working together with our undergraduate brothers, alumni, and friends for the upcoming 2020-21 school year, no matter how different it may look.

### Mu Chapter Foundation Launches Internship Program

ince Cornell closed its on-campus instruction back in March, Sigma Pi brothers faced challenges and adapted to this changing world. One of these changes was the loss of summer internships. Many brothers who retained internships transitioned to unpaid work. To assist the undergraduate brothers through this time of uncertainty, the Educational Foundation started a campaign to match Mu Chapter alumni with undergraduate brothers for summer internships and to create grants to help undergraduates fund these experiences and other hardships associated with COVID-19. With the help of our gracious alumni, the foundation was able to mobilize resources and secure funding for the current undergrads. Approximately \$18,000 was raised—gifts ranged from \$10 to \$6,000.

Through this campaign, the Educational Foundation matched three undergraduate brothers with alumni. Trevor Faulk '21 and Alex Frank '21 are working for Nick Ornitz '16 at his startup, Dwelling (hellodwelling. com). It is platform for virtual home maintenance, much like telemedicine for your home. Zain Fazal '23 is working for Andrew Joseph '16 and Ethan Joseph '13 at Apres Lodge, a boutique hotel in Whitefish, Mont. Trevor described the summer as a great experience so far. He said, "Nick Ornitz and Shannon Kay, co-founders of Dwelling, let me take ownership of many projects. In only four

weeks, I have gotten to contribute, brainstorm, and be a part of the organization even more than I'd hoped."

Zain shared similar sentiments. "Over the past few weeks, I have had the privilege of working with Ethan and Andrew Joseph on developing the Apres Lodge group as an emerging hotel presence in the northwest. The experience of conducting market studies and underwriting properties is something I would never get from a conventional internship role at my age. As a rising sophomore, I am fortunate to have this exposure so early in my college career."

The undergraduate brothers have also enjoyed opportunities to work with alumni through sharing stories of the house and connecting on these shared experiences. Trevor shared, "It is great that I've gotten to work with a fellow Sigma Pi. We have been able to share some stories about our times in the house. It goes to show that Sigma Pi has provided us with a massive network of alumni who can help and teach you in ways I would not have expected by joining a fraternity."

Alumni have enjoyed the opportunity to work with undergraduates. Nick Ornitz wrote, "The opportunity to work with undergraduate brothers, Trevor Faulk and Alex Frank, has been a rewarding experience and nice way to stay connected. The existing trust in Pi brothers

made it a unique opportunity to bring Alex and Trevor onto the team at Dwelling. As a difficult time for undergrad recruiting during the pandemic we were glad to be able to offer the roles and have been thrilled with their work so far."

Finally, the Educational Foundation provided seven—and counting—undergraduate brothers with a summer grant through this same campaign. Koby Kiefer '22 is an undergraduate brother working at Platinum Real Estate analyzing the impact of COVID-19 in relation to future home buying trends and mortgage rates. He received of one of the grants this summer. Koby's internship transitioned from a paid position to one that was experienced-based due to the Coronavirus. Therefore, he shared "the stipend that I will receive will help offset my expenses for the summer and allow for me to have this experience." Other grant recipients affected in a variety of ways by COVID-19 also noted how the Educational Foundation's grants are helping them get through these troubling

We are excited that the Educational Foundation was able to successfully assist undergraduate brothers during this time of uncertainty by connecting them to alumni and by the ability to provide some financial relief to those in need.

able to hear from lawyers, business leaders, medical professionals, entrepreneurs, etc. Hearing their experiences through our biweekly alumni talk, shaped the set of careers I pursued post-graduation. Q: What skills did you learn or hone as the Educational Foundation intern that have carried over into your professional life?

A: Yes, our alumni lead, Michael Vernick '83, is now one of my good mentors. He advises me on both professional and academic growth.
