he Sigma Pi Educational Foundation is proud to have completed its 12th anniversary in 2019. The Foundation is dedicated to funding educational programs for the brothers of Mu Chapter, enhancing the learning infrastructure of the house, supporting programming that benefits the youth of the greater Ithaca community, and providing mentorship and leadership opportunities for the undergraduates. We have accomplished a tremendous amount and I thank all of you who have contributed their time, resources, and financial support to help achieve our goals.

The Educational Foundation is part of the legacy that Jim Keene '57, together with Bert Harrop '61, built at Sigma Pi. Jim and Bert envisioned an organization within Mu Chapter that would broaden brothers' experiences, diversify and enhance their academic and non-academic orientation, help improve their leadership skills, and ensure that Sigma Pi brothers would also become more involved in

the Ithaca community. Their perspectives help differentiate Sigma Pi and make it the unique fraternity that it is today.

The Foundation continues to support its core program, College Mentors for Kids. Nine brothers are participating with Little Buddies in Ithaca schools, with one holding a leadership position in the organization, and two more brothers to take on leadership positions this spring. The Foundation was a significant supporter of the development of the Learning Commons—part of the kitchen and dining project. We are happy to know that brothers are using the enhanced study environment for collaboration and meeting space daily.

The new wi-fi is another critical component of recent innovation. Combined with the **Richard Cahoon '77** Tech Center, brothers can routinely take advantage of state-of-the-art technology to help them meet their demanding academic requirements. The Foundation has

also supported brothers' attendance at various leadership conferences, sponsored educational and career services and onsite speaker conferences, created intern positions for brothers, and supported educationally oriented scholarships.

It has been my pleasure to serve as the Foundation's president for the past three-and-a-half years. I thank all alumni and brothers for their support during that time. I also want to thank the Foundation Board of Directors that is growing and is well positioned for the future. We are fortunate that **Joe Zanetta '75** will assume the role of president in January 2020. I look forward to working with Joe as we plan for the future.

2019 DONATIONS ALLOW EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE FOR MU CHAPTER

his has been a busy year for the Foundation. We have received donations from 26 brothers and friends of Mu Chapter, collectively contributing \$8,318 to the Foundation during 2019. As of this writing the Foundation's entire portfolio's value is \$49,355, which consists of \$3,676 in the operating account and \$44,679 in the investment portfolio. The investment portfolio returned 14.11% for 2019 versus 25.70% for the S&P 500. The lag results from the approximately 40% allocation into CDs, which were held from January into June before being used toward the Learning Commons.

With the help of our donors this year, we have:

- Continued our mission as a supporter of College Mentors for Kids with our annual donation.
- Awarded our annual David Harrop Memorial Scholarship to **Joseph Brogan '20**.
- Sponsored six attendees at DealBook Conference in NYC, hosted by Brother Andrew Sorkin '99.
- Provided access to online studying and collaboration tools for undergraduate brothers.

- Funded two house intern positions for Harry Drahzal '20 and Adomas Hassan '20, focused on career services and supporting the Educational Foundation community activities.
- Purchased plaques for the newly named **James H. Keene III '57** Memorial Library.

The Foundation has been very happy to see the Learning Commons become a focal point for collaborative study for our undergraduate brothers. Mu Chapter is flourishing as a true hub for education and stands out from its peer fraternities with the resources provided by generous alumni.

The Educational Foundation thanks all those who have supported and continue to support all our endeavors. None of these activities could take place without the generosity of our brotherhood and the greater Mu Chapter alumni community. We look forward to working together with our undergraduate brothers, our alumni, and our friends in 2020 and beyond!

Cornell Chapter of College Mentors for Kids has Impressive 2019

ollege Mentors for Kids at Cornell University has hit an incredibly positive and impressive stride in its performance this year. Not only has the new leadership taken the responsibility to enact quick and constructive change, but their passion for seeing this chapter grow and succeed is nothing short of miraculous. Despite some unexpected and difficult challenges, Cornell's chapter of College Mentors for Kids has surpassed many of the goals that were set for them, some by the national office and some that they placed upon their own shoulders.

This semester, the chapter matched a total of 51 Little Buddies and mentors from two different elementary schools – Caroline Elementary and Cayuga Heights Elementary – which represents an increase in

service numbers by almost 25% from the previous school year. While higher service numbers are fantastic, the real measure of the chapter's

Not only is Cornell's chapter serving more kids, but their activities are more engaging, their leadership is more accountable, and their mentors are of much higher quality. 

In terms of new efforts, the fall saw the introduction of the No Shave November campaign, where we raised more than




Chapter "Movember" t-shirt. Additionally, we volunteered at a local library to help put on a community show and at multiple food drives with various sororities.
