Thank You, James Keene III '57

Mu Chapter will gather in New York City on January 26, 2012, to celebrate James "Jim" Keene III '57, who has served Sigma Pi for over 50 years. He has tirelessly pursued the improvement of the brotherhood, and it was his lone efforts that, on numerous occasions, sustained the chapter during times of need.


Jim pledged and was initiated in the fall of 1953, and over his years in the house he served as house manager, rush chairman, first counselor, and sage (twice!). He initiated the idea of expanding the dining room and, as a committee of one (with help from Harry Specht), saw to its completion.

When it came time to expand and renovate the chapter house, Jim led the charge on raising the funds. After the house burned down, he remained committed to preserving the integrity of the house's design. He conceived the McGraw Place Project, which expanded the fraternity's property in a land swap with Cornell, and the Beach Project, which has made the house an incredible place to live.

During his 20 years as president, Jim was also responsible for the reorganization of the alumni board, its ongoing professional management, and the diversity of its members by garnering participants from all eras. With the assistance of Director Steven A. Hobbs '80, he also helped create the Mu Chapter Educational Foundation.

These are just a few of the highlights in Jim's long career serving Sigma Pi, and they are the impetus for the planned honorary dinner. The dinner will be an addition to the Seventh Annual Sigma Pi Undergraduate Career Event, which has brought undergraduates to New York City for the past six years to network Mu Chapter alumni, who can help the students with their resumes and interview skills and give students a chance to shadow alumni professionals.

The honorary dinner is planned for **6:00 p.m.** on Thursday, January **26**, **2012**, and will take place at the New York Athletic Club on 7th Avenue and



59th Street. As part of the program there will be a high-quality dinner booklet, within which alumni may publish messages of support and thanks to Jim, photos, and other memories. The entire weekend was moving for both undergraduates and alumni as we discussed the many differences and (more importantly!) similarities between the Mu Chapter of 20, 30, or 40 years ago and the Mu Chapter of today. The most beautiful moment came when alumni and actives broke out in song in the

Memorial Library, joining together to sing the ever present "Pi Phi Song." We sincerely hope that our future alumni events are as well attended and carry the same energy.

Due to the phenomenal support of our alumni, the undergraduate experience continues to improve. We are looking forward to making better use of the educational fund to support the brotherhood's academic pursuits. The house is under continuous maintenance (and I mean this in the best possible way) and Chef Patrick has dramatically improved his performance this semester. Brothers now sit down for meals together twice a week, and we hope to expand the practice to more days in the future.

Unfortunately, despite having the largest membership in recent years, we have fallen short of capacity in the house due to an unusually large number of brothers abroad and living in Collegetown. The chapter had to make extra funds available to help pay for the shortfall, and although the situation is less than ideal, it is one from which we can learn and will certainly avoid

in the future. The long-time trend of seniors moving to Collegetown will slowly start to reverse when several seniors (myself included) conintue to live in the house next year.

Going forward, the chapter is looking ahead to rush week and to becoming an even more selective house in terms of the quality of men we pledge and initiate. I am hoping that this spring we can have alumni back to welcome new members, so please stay on the lookout for announcements regarding initiation events.

I believe the other chapter leaders have outlined the house's progress in their respective areas, so rather than recap more of the developments around the house, I would like to take one more opportunity to thank the alumni for their continuous support of the house. I have felt their efforts particularly poignantly this semester, and I am personally (as is the house) indebted to many of them. Sigma Pi is an experience that makes Cornell special, and we hope to keep it that way for many years to come.

Cornell Annual Fund: Allocating Your Donation



I just want to remind everyone that Cornell Annual Fund gifts may be allocated to more than one place. Those of you who are

> so inclined may designate a portion of your Cornell Annual Fund gifts to the Daniel F. Mahaney '79 Memorial Scholarship Fund. Each

year, a scholarship is awarded to a Cornell undergraduate student who has devoted himself/herself to the kinds of volunteer activities with the university unions that were so important to our brother, Dan, during his undergraduate years.

This is not intended to be a solicitation to encourage donations to Cornell or to the Mu Chapter; it is merely a reminder that you may want to designate a portion of your Cornell donation to the scholarship fund in Dan's memory.

To do so, simply indicate on the Cornell Annual Fund response card that this year you want all or a portion of your contribution to Cornell to be applied toward the Daniel Mahaney Scholarship. On the blank line in front

of the words "In addition, I would like to support," you should insert the dollar amount that you want to direct toward Dan's memorial scholarship; on the blank line below those words, you should write "Daniel Mahaney Scholarship Fund."

If you make your Cornell Annual Fund donation by phone instead, simply let the phonea-thon caller know how much of your contribution to the annual fund you want specifically allocated to Dan's memorial scholarship.

Thanks to all of you who have supported this scholarship in Dan's memory over the years, and to all who do so now and in the future.
