Please let me know of your potential interest and involvement as we begin to plan another successful career event for the undergraduates.



Centennial Recap: A Grand Success!

Enveloped by splendid early-fall weather, an assembly of over 200 brothers and their guests gathered in Ithaca this September to celebrate the 100-year anniversary of Sigma Pi at Cornell. Brothers spanning classes from 1955 to 2017 shared in the celebration of our remarkable history.

Immediately upon entering the Pi-house, guests were greeted by current undergraduate brothers at a bannered welcome desk, complete with vital information for the weekend and commemorative shirts and hats for sale. Throughout the house, poster-sized enlargements of photographs from the past 60 years of Sigma Pi activities were exhibited. The posters included photographs of everything from group shots of the 1954 pledge formal and 1977 Homecoming to Zoltan performing at Rock n' Roll Tea and Ring-around-the-Dong at Fun-in-the-Sun. Also scattered throughout the house were copies of the original flyers for 805 at Rock n' Roll Tea and Toad the Wet Sprocket at Hurlothrumbo. The weekend started on Thursday night with a sumptuous Steaks n' Bakes cookout on the front porch. Refreshing adult beverages were consumed over hours of lively conversation, and many brothers made the requisite late-night pilgrimage to the Hot Truck (yes, it's still there and still popular).





Beginning early Friday morning, 28 brothers golfed at Cornell's Robert Trent Jones Golf Course. Remarkably, no one was hurt. That night, the kickoff dinner was held at the Ramin Room in Bartles Hall. The casual diners enjoyed a cocktail hour and delightful meal from Cornell Catering while a slide show of photographs of Pi-Man escapades from the past 60 years projected continuously. After the meal, the proud tradition of after-dinner announcements was revived. Brothers shared both old memories and thoughts about the future. In addition, the "rest of the story" story behind a selection of Name That Pi-Man photos was presented as a slide show. It was also announced that Sigma Pi had introduced a new philanthropic student organization to campus, College Mentors for Kids, and that the undergraduate brothers would play a significant role in the student leadership of the organization. The night ended with

another lively party back at the house.

Saturday morning started early (8:30!) with a coaches panel and breakfast in Friends Hall. In a grand, wood-paneled room overlooking Schoellkopf Field, about 40 Pi-men were treated to a presentation on the present and future of Cornell's most acclaimed sports teams. The venerable and resplendent Richie Moran led the interactive discussion with Cornell's hockey, lacrosse, and wrestling coaches. After the discussion, the Pi-men were given a private

(continued from pg. one) tour of Lynah Rink and the new, state-of-the-art athletic training and wrestling facilities. Later that afternoon, Associate Professor Jeff Hancock, Department of Psychology, delivered a stimulating lecture entitled



"The Psychology of Money." More than 100 people packed the Lynch Room in the Johnson Art Museum, with its panoramic view of Cayuga Lake. In his talk, Dr. Hancock addressed the potentially problematic financial inequality that exists in the United States. The talk catalyzed a spirited discussion; Dr. Hancock stayed to answer questions for over an hour.

As day turned to night, Pi-men and their guests migrated to the Statler Hotel's Grand Ballroom for the semi-formal Centennial Dinner. Before dinner, Sigma Pi's national grand second counselor, Andrew Morris, announced that Jim Keene '57 was to receive the Sigma Pi Founders Award. Jim is only the 96th person to receive this prestigious award. Next, NASA flight surgeon Joe Dervay '80 surprised the crowd by announcing that the Sigma Pi charter was, at that moment, circling the earth on the International Space Station (ISS). Joe worked with his friend and NASA astronaut Captain Chris Cassidy to get the charter aboard the ISS. As he projected images of the charter free-floating in space

inside the space station, Joe read a greeting from Captain Cassidy: "To the brothers of Sigma Pi at Cornell - Much congratulations upon celebrating the 100-year anniversary of your fraternity. It was an honor to fly your charter, and I truly hope you enjoy

the images from space. All the best as you begin your second century of brotherhood."

Following the sumptuous meal, Jim Keene entertained the gathering with a stirring slide presentation on the distinguished history of Sigma Pi at Cornell. The presentation included a video message from Dr. Frank Rhodes (ninth president of Cornell) and was punctuated with a cappella songs from the tuxedoed Hangovers. At the end of the evening, all present raised their glasses in a toast as they sang "The Men of Sigma Pi."

Following this memorable event, the brothers and their guests returned to the house for the Centennial blast: two simultaneous parties! In the west lounge, Mark Nadler, for years the featured entertainer at Sardi's in NYC, provided cabaret-style entertainment while playing the Pi-house's newly tuned grand piano. Mark led a room full of people singing both old and current favorites (from Billy Joel to Frank Sinatra). The undergrads helped fill the room with song. If they needed help, Mark sent links/texts to the un-

dergrads who sang as they read the lyrics on their smartphones. While people were singing in the west lounge, bands were rocking the dining room. Howie Gordon '81 played the drums for one set with his band Men with Big Hips before joining the Band of Brothers (Sandy Kraker '74, Dave D'Orlando '79, Jay Sacco'80, Kevin Kruse'79, Brian Finneran'81, and Owen McCarron'80) for several hours of hard-core rock and roll. Multiple generations of Pi-men and Pi-Women danced to Sigma Pi favorites from bands like the Stones, Jethro Tull, and Led Zepplin. Sometime after 1:00 a.m., Cornell Safety arrived to tell us to turn down the volume—a sure sign of a good party.

Dawn on Sunday greeted a weary, but happy group of Pi-men. Brothers gathered on the front porch for brunch and final goodbyes on another beautiful day. A large contingent also trekked to The Pines to enjoy the iconic meal of Pinesburgers and bloodies.

At the end of the weekend, all agreed the party that was "one century in the making" was a grand success!



The soccer team, led by goalie and team captain Brendon Viña, remained unbeaten throughout the regular season in the league's toughest division and secured the 13th seed in the playoff bracket. First-year players-including striker Billy Alford, midfielder Lorenzo De Simone, and center back Robby Attiastepped up tremendously in the postseason, helping Sigma Pi knock off Delta Phi in the first round and Chi Phi in the guarterfinals. Unfortunately, however, the playoff run came to a close when Lambda Chi edged out a 2-1 victory over Sigma Pi in the semis.

The widespread house interest in flag football led to the creation of two teams, one comprising sophomores and the other seniors. The quarterback of the sophomore team, Nick Ornitz, suffered a collarbone fracture early on in the season, but the team still prevailed and finished at the top of its division. The team went on to beat Chi Psi in the first round of the playoffs, 25-19, but lost a nail-biter in the second round to Chi Phi, 21-20. The senior team also finished at the top of its own division with a record of 3-1 but lost in the first round of the playoffs.

In the tennis doubles tournament, Sigma Pi put up a strong fight and made it all the way to the semifinals. The Pi house enjoyed similar success in the sand volleyball tournament, once again making it to the semis. As we go to press and the end of the semester approaches, the indoor volleyball team looks to make a deep run in the postseason with its newly added firepower in James Alvarez and Alec Charbonneau.

Sigma Pi has its eves set on once again hoisting the coveted All-Sports Championship Trophy. With the spring 2014 season just around the corner, the Mu Chapter knows that it has what it takes to rise to the top of the fraternity sports world.
