The spring semester has been quite an adventure for the brothers of Sigma Pi Mu Chapter. A week before classes started, the brothers returned to 730 University Ave. to participate in new-member recruitment week. The 19 new members were initiated on February 19, and with them, we now have 72 active brothers!

Our brothers continue to excel in leadership positions all over campus, with numerous involvements in prominent organizations. Brother **Turkel Anwar '15** is keeping the Student Agency tradition alive as president of Cornell's oldest student-run business. Brothers **Connor Riser '16** and **James Alvarez '16** hold positions on the IFC (see article on page 4). College Mentors for Kids continues to be a huge success on campus, with several brothers holding positions on the executive board (**David Dellapelle '17**, **Joe Manzi '16**, **Reid Paoletta '16**, **Brandon Choi '16**) and many others brothers having roles as general managers and mentors.

Since the last edition of *The Muse*, there have been several high points, including

Alumni Treasurer's Report

John J. Haggerty '78, Treasurer, Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi Alumni Corporation

With the successful conclusion of the 2013-2014 Centennial Campaign effort, the balance of the outstanding mortgage on the house was officially paid off on October 28, 2014, and recorded as discharged with the Tompkins County Clerk on December 16, 2014. In February of 2015, using funds from the spring 2015 rent collection, a short-term line-of-credit note in the amount of \$30,000, borrowed during the period of low house occupancy in 2013, was also paid off. I am pleased to announce that, for the first time in my eight years as alumni corporation treasurer, thanks in large part to the generous participation of both alumni and active brothers in ongoing fundraising, Sigma Pi Mu Chapter is not only debt free but also has a small positive savings balance.

The mortgage and line of credit represented a drag of about \$3800 per month on the operating budget of the house. Through the end of 2014 and up to the present, we have been aggressively investing in visible improvements to Sigma Pi. We engaged a local landscaper (and a Cornell alumni) to design new plantings and to begin needed improvements to the lawns and gardens. John Morrison '75 spearheaded an effort to completely refurnish the West Lounge. We have upgraded exterior lighting (efficient LED motion detectors for security) and instituted a regular program of bulk waste removal and general grounds cleaning. We are in the final stages of a complete reengineering of the house IT infrastructure to support the massive proliferation of wireless devices, a full perimeter security camera system, and the planned addition of permanent video-conferencing capability to the Memorial Room. Our goal is to make Sigma Pi Mu Chapter a leader in technology among Greek houses, with facilities as good or better than those provided in the Cornell dorms.

On the continuing capital improvement list is the need to replace the windows in the house, starting with the casement-style windows on the third floor, as well as to paint the house's exterior. The current windows were installed when the house was re-built in 1993, and they have not aged well. We are studying a number of options, including repairs by the original manufacturer or phased replacement of all 60+ windows. Replacement estimates are in the \$130K-\$160K range, and the house painting will cost \$30K. This investment would be recovered in fuel savings because many of the current windows do not seal well and draft complaints are common, resulting in thermostats being set higher to offset the heat loss.

We have been developing a priority list of infrastructure enhancements, including a keyless-entry system for the front door, card-key systems for the sleeping-room doors, and generally enhanced security. We have also established a committee to study the use and condition of the kitchen equipment and the layout of the dining room. With the mortgage eliminated, we have much greater financial security and the ability to take on significant projects. Continued giving to Sigma Pi will help us maintain our rightful place as one of Cornell University's best fraternity houses.

Please think about visiting the house if you can, be it for reunions in June or anytime during the year. We are proud of what we have been able to do with your substantial and continuing financial support. All alumni are always welcome. Mu Undergrads Referred to Judicial Review Board

On Friday, February 20, 2015 the Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi was placed on interim suspension by Cornell, based on allegations of inappropriate behavior made during the new-member process. Mu Chapter alumni board and Sigma Pi International worked closely with the undergraduates to ensure complete cooperation with Cornell's Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs (OFSIL) in their investigation. On Monday, March 1, the interim suspension was lifted and the undergraduate brothers were referred to the Greek Judicial Board.

On April 8, 2015, the official Interfraternity Council Judicial Hearing took place. In advance of the hearing, OFSIL conducted a thorough investigation. While we recognize Cornell University must take any allegation of misconduct seriously, it became clear that there was a great deal of contradictory evidence, as well as some individuals recanting their initial claims of misconduct.

However, one area of unintentional misconduct was the description of past initiation activities to the new members, who felt these obsolete practices might occur. Additionally, the use of a point system to determine house room selection was found to have resulted in a form of unintended intimidation of the new members.

On April 20, 2015, the results of the hearing were released, and Mu Chapter received an official warning. In addition, chapter education for new-member recruitment will be reexamined for next year's incoming class of new members.

Before this incident, efforts were already underway by the alumni board's Brotherhood Committee (led my **Matt Pens '00**), in partnership with Sigma Pi International and the undergraduate brothers, to create a positive and forward-looking new-member process. More information on the results of these efforts will be outlined in the fall issue of *The Muse*.

Mentorship Program Launched

One of the most frequent requests from undergraduates when they speak to alumni is for assistance with career planning, internships, mentorships, and job placement. They also want advice from alumni regarding graduate school and/or post-graduate degrees.

In response, the Career Development Committee, chaired by Tom Silver '81 and Rob Novo '79, launched a pilot mentorship program in January. The pilot program matched alumni and undergraduates with similar career interests, academic backgrounds, and experience.

More than 20 undergraduates were matched with alumni, and, as of the end of March, approximately 80 percent have initiated contact and have had meaningful, productive conversations. The feedback on these conversations has been extremely positive, with both alumni and their mentors indicating they are excited about the relationship and have scheduled follow-up discussions and, in some instances, faceto-face meetings. The Career Development Committee continues to work through logistics to get the remaining mentor/mentee relationships established and expects more connections to occur before the end of the school year. Even though it is still in its early stages, there have been some successes. For example, through the connection made between mentor Alan Portnoi '84 and his mentee Adam Gottleib '15, they were able to find a summer intern for Alan: none other than fellow undergrad Pi Man Steven Siegel '17.

Looking forward, the program hopes to take advantage of the developing Tech Center. This will allow easier and more frequent alumni/undergraduate communications, which can promote even more meaningful relationships between undergraduates and alumni, including potential career "days," specialized workshops, and other events to link alumni and undergraduates.

Thank you to all of the alumni who volunteered to be mentors. Your time and expertise is greatly appreciated. The Career Development Committee continues to be in need of alumni who would be willing to assist undergraduates in career planning, whether it be through a mentorship, offering career advice, linking undergraduates with internship connections or opportunities, providing assistance to undergrads in networking, or even participation in a formal or informal program to provide insight on your industry, job, or career path. Muse: Can you talk a little bit about Autotech Ventures and how you got involved?

Quin Garcia: I was working in China with an electric vehicle startup, negotiating automotive tech partnerships with large

> corporations, and came to the realization that the transportation sector would soon be disrupted. I tried to find a money manager who could invest my money for me and give me pure exposure to transportation tech, but after a long search, I was unable to find any such money manager. So, I

started trading in transportation tech stocks on my own, did really well at it, and eventually decided to move back to Silicon Valley to form Autotech Ventures as the first VC firm investing exclusively in road-transportation tech startups.

Just before going to press, we elected our new e-board (see page 9 for the list). And all of the current brothers have given in support of our annual giving campaign.



Sigma Pi Mu Chapter is making unprecedented strides in its philanthropy efforts, both at Cornell and beyond. As such, we pulled out all the stops to ensure the event was a huge success. There was a sand volleyball court in the parking lot, cotton candy machines, plenty of barbecued food, and raffle prizes donated from local businesses to entice students from all backgrounds to attend and to donate to the cause. It is efforts such as these that demonstrate our chapter's dedication to helping children who need it most.

We also maintained our participation in other philanthropy events, most notably the new members' fantastic dance at Delta Gamma's annual fund raising event, Anchor Jam, and the annual Movember Campaign, which helps raise money for men's health issues.




Recruitment Yields 19 Outstanding Men for Sigma Pi

Muse: When you started at Cornell, did you have a career path in mind?

Quin: When I arrived at Cornell, I knew I loved cars and technology but wasn't sure how to make a career out of it. I didn't know which career to pursue, so I chose to study applied economics and management with the hope it would give me a solid academic foundation in business, which could be applied to various industries. I only figured out which career to pursue after I graduated.

Muse: What at Cornell helped develop your interest in working at a tech startup?

Quin: While I was at Cornell, I got involved in the Cornell Hybrid Electric Vehicle team as a hobby to satisfy my addiction to classic cars. Though it started as a hobby, it taught me about automotive technologies and the inner workings of the auto industry, which eventually guided me toward transportation technology startups.

Muse: Did you plan on pledging to a fraternity before you arrived at Cornell?

Quin: Fraternities aren't as popular in California, where I'm from, so I didn't fully understand them when I arrived at Cornell, but I decided to check them out during rush week. As a transfer student, I had no friends at Cornell and had never heard of any of the fraternities, so I just walked around to the houses near my West Campus dorm room.

Muse: What lead you to join Sigma Pi?

Quin: I wasn't anxious to join a fraternity, so I decided that, no matter how entertaining or fun any fraternity could be, I would only join a house if I felt a deep respect for the brothers that could endure long-term. Of all the houses I rushed, Sigma Pi was the most genuine and kind group of people I met, and I knew I would respect them in the long-term, so my decision was easy.

Muse: What influence did your time at Sigma Pi have professionally on your time at Cornell and your time after graduation?

Quin: At Cornell, I spent my time in class, at the Cornell Hybrid Electric Vehicle lab, and with Sigma Pi. The classroom shaped my academic abilities, Cornell HEV shaped my career trajectory, and Sigma Pi shaped my personality. For a number of years after graduation, I was one of the lone Sigma Pi young alums living on the West Coast and working in tech startups, so I didn't have much professional overlap with Sigma Pis in the first five years of my career. However, more and more Sigma Pis have moved west and have gotten into the startup and venture capital business, and many of them have been my roommates out here, so there's now a strong West Coast Pi house diaspora.

Muse: Do you maintain much contact



Undergrads & Alumni Work To Enhance Dining & Kitchen

Today, undergraduate brothers living in and out of the house want flexibility when they eat, given their busy schedules. We serve 10 distinct meal periods every week, Sunday through Thursdays. On Mondays through Thursdays, lunch is offered, starting at approximately 11:30 a.m., and dinner is served, starting at approximately 5:30 p.m. On Sundays, brunch is offered, starting at approximately 10:00 a.m. In addition to these daily meals, the kitchen is also fully stocked with ready-to-cook frozen foods, cereals and oatmeal, milk and OJ, breakfast bars, breads, and a deli bar with vegetables, deli meats, and salads. Dining facilities can accommodate 50-75 people at one time. Brotherhood dinners, during which the majority of the brotherhood makes time to eat together, occur on Sundays after chapter meetings and on Thursdays.

The Sigma Pi kitchen is open for all brothers to use throughout the day, at night during the week, and during the day over weekends, conditions permitting.* During weekdays in which the house chef is on staff (9–5), hot meals are prepared for brothers, and thus, the kitchen facilities, such as the flat top, grill, and range, are not available for use. However, after dinner hours and over night, these facilities are available for brothers to use with the food that is stocked in the kitchen. During weekends, the kitchen is open for typical

meal periods during the day but is typically locked at night.

As stated above (*), the kitchen is open for brothers to use on their own under permitting conditions of cleanliness. If certain areas of the kitchen do not meet the cleanliness standards that are set forth to the house by the resident advisor and the steward, they are permitted to close and lock the kitchen until brothers step forward to clean. Areas of importance for cleaning include the following: sanitizing and cleaning all kitchen equipment and food preparing surfaces, taking out trash, and cleaning dirty eating utensils and plates in the dishwasher. These tasks are fulfilled on a daily basis by 3-4 brothers who are assigned to dinner duty to keep the kitchen cleanliness in daily order.

Two significant house positions that deal directly with the kitchen facilities are the in-house resident advisor and the steward. The steward is a house-elected position that is fulfilled by one of the active brothers. Primary jobs of the steward involve coordinating with the chef on stocking kitchen inventory, planning and deciding what the 10 daily meals of the week will be, and organizing the cleaning of the kitchen by scheduling brothers to do dinner duty and ensuring that cleanliness standards are being met. The resident advisor oversees the steward's position to make sure that the position's standards are met, and in addition, acts as an important liaison in dealing with the chef's administrative issues.
