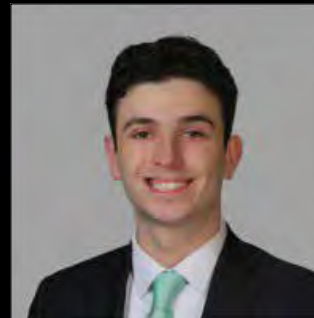

Spring 2022 Treasurer's Report

As I sit here in Ithaca and look out the window at several inches of freshly fallen, heavy, wet snow, I am reminded of how late "spring" sometimes arrives in the Finger Lakes. I missed my spring-break trip to the Keys, so this hurts even more. But, Ithaca has its beauty, as all of you know; I just wish it would get here soon!

We continue to operate the fraternity well below the live-in capacity (44) and, for the last two semesters, below break-even with respect to costs. As you might recall, following a recruitment violation during fall 2021 rush, we were not allowed to take a new class. As a reminder, there are two sources of funds to operate the house: rent collected from the live-in brothers and donations from generous alumni (thank you!).

The small cushion of savings that we had built up is being eroded by the need to replace the entire beach roof membrane and decking system, work that is scheduled to begin as soon as the house is empty

after graduation. This cost will be in the neighborhood of \$60,000, but it is essential that the work be done, because damage to the interior of the West Lounge has already occurred.

One of the most significant recurring expenses of the fraternity is insurance. This year, our insurance premiums increased 30% on the heels of smaller but significant increases in the last three years. With help from **Dave D'Orlando '79**, we hope to identify alternative sources for insurance, including evaluating offerings from a group selected by Sigma Pi Fraternity, International. While all operating costs have been increasing, the rate of increase in insurance, on top of a very large base number, is concerning. Again, smaller new-member classes do not help with increasing costs.

Our collections experience this semester was much improved, with most brothers paying in full when bills were due, but the level of effort that went into achieving this result was unprecedented. We hope that, going forward, the actives will pay more attention to their financial responsibility to

the house.

I will end this report by asking again for help. The undergraduates need more financial guidance than I have been able to give them, strictly due to other demands on my time. The handoff from undergraduate treasurer to undergraduate treasurer has been inadequate. The primary need is help with budgeting and managing a budget. If you are an alumnus with a financial practice or background, there is a great opportunity to lighten my load by taking on an advisory role with the undergraduate brothers. We have professional accountants who keep the books, but the brothers need someone to provide them with guidance. If you want to discuss, send me an e-mail at JH56@cornell.edu, and I will reach out.

As always, thank you for your support of Mu Chapter. Your unrestricted gifts to the house corporation allow us to do the necessary maintenance and repair work, even during lean times! I am grateful on behalf of the active brothers. Happy Holidays to all.

Often, Sigma Pi brothers ask me what the foundation does; the short answer is we provide resources to enhance the undergraduate experience of our current brothers.

Philanthropy is defined as love of mankind, and the foundation seeks funds to support our beloved house on University Avenue.

Recently, it was discovered that some of the computer equipment in the Learning Commons needed replacement and new technology. In addition, the televisions were not the latest and greatest. Time for the foundation to show its love; we funded the improvements and bought the new television sets.

We are a small group of alumni, approximately 1,200 strong, and the foundation is not well-endowed. We are exploring ways to create a permanent source of funding. But in the meantime, we need your gifts and philanthropy to support our brothers. We have provided internships, funded visiting lectures, hosted career events, invested in technology, and awarded scholarships, including the David Harrop Memorial Scholarship.

None of these enhancements to life at Sigma Pi would be possible without the generosity of our dedicated brothers. We are a "fellowship of kindred minds," and we must continue to nurture and grow our alumni funding, which is the corpus of the foundation. Band of Brothers 2022 Reunion Party Preview

It was the fall of 1979, one of those rare sunny afternoons in Ithaca that belied the long cold winter to come, when the heavy-metal sound of Rush's breakout 1976 release 2112 burst from the West Lounge at 730 University Avenue. Curious brothers, drawn to the concert volume music, looked in expecting to find Geddy Lee and company on the turntable. Instead, Jay "Sac" Sacco '80, was standing in front of a refrigerator-sized amplifier stack, blasting out the opening power cords of the epic first track on a Les Paul electric guitar. Howie Gordon '81, feet pounding and hands a blur of wooden sticks, hammered out the complex rhythm on a full drum kit. The two, inspired by legendary Pi-house band Zoltan, resolved to form a band with a goal to play a Pi-house party. There was even talk of headlining Rock 'n' Roll Tea. Sac and Howie, now big brother and little brother, sought out other musicians and rehearsed in the basement of the coop on the corner of Stewart and University, but the dream remained elusive during their time at Cornell.

Post-graduation, Jay went on to form Spectre and Reckless in the mid-Hudson valley before moving to Austin, Texas. Howie, coincidentally with Dave D'Orlando '79, jammed with rock royalty at Rock and Roll Fantasy Camp in NYC in 2006. Howie returned in 2007 to share the stage with Paul Stanley of KISS. After stints as percussionist with the Charlie Van Pelt Band and as keyboardist for 11 Ways, Howie currently drums for NYC-based Men With Big Hips, an Allman Brothers-influenced jam band, and the Long Island classic rock band Beach

Drive. Jay and Howie would not cross musical paths again for years to come.

2011 was a tough year for Pi men all over the world. We lost The Doll that year, and a big tribute was planned to celebrate his life. Howie's Men with Big Hips was booked to play the party. The largest gathering of Pi men in the history of the Pi house began to take shape. Phone calls were made and an idea took root. With Howie and Sac together once again, the dream could be realized. Men with Big Hips would play the first set, and a few Pi musicians, led by Sac, would play the second set, backed by the Hips.

That summer, a set list was developed, but there was no opportunity to rehearse. Undeterred, the Pi musicians took the stage. Anchored by Howie on drums and the Hips on the back-line, the hybrid band, fronted by Zoltan founding member Sandy Kraker '74, rocked the house. "Tribute to the Doll: Live and Unrehearsed," Oct 22, 2011, was the culmination of a life-long love of music and brotherhood. The Doll had once again been the life-changing catalyst that forged every Pi man who'd known him. Howie and Sac's dream, 31 years in the making, had been realized.

2013 was a banner year for Mu Chapter. The centennial celebration would be another blow-out event, featuring Men with Big Hips. It would also provide another opportunity for Sac and Howie to build on past success. The Pi band grew as other Pi musicians volunteered their talents. Band of Brothers was born.

On September 7, 2013, still live and unrehearsed, the musical talents of Jay Sacco, Owen McCarron '80, Brian Finneran '81,

Dave D'Orlando '79, Howie Gordon, Kevin Kruse '79, and Sandy Kraker took the stage, once again backed by the Hips, and brought the house down. One of Kevin's sons, Garrett Kruse, sat in on drums for a song—he was still in high school at the time!

Fast forward to 2021. Cornell had canceled the past two Reunions and Homecomings due to the global pandemic. This year, Homecoming would go ahead and BoB was to be Saturday night's headliner. Unfortunately, with Howie unable to make the date, BoB needed to find a drummer and bass player. Enter Tom Garr '76, drummer extraordinaire. With Zoltan on his resume, BoB snapped him up. He and Sandy had played well over a hundred shows during Zoltan's tenure, and it would be an honor to share the stage with them. Zoltan alumni have played the house three times since 2000, one of which was a tribute to Sandy's little brother and Zoltan's bass player, Reber Carroll '75. Zoltan played Rock 'n' Roll Tea in the mid '70s, and Sandy played RnRT with his band, Intrigue, in the early '80s.

But who would play bass?

Brian "FinDog" Finneran stepped up, volunteering to put down his classic '70s Fender Telecaster and don another classic, a Rickenbacker bass. BoB's lineup was complete. We worked out the song list and practiced on our own all summer. One week before Homecoming, with the pandemic surging, Cornell canceled the event. BoB was left hanging, all dressed up but nowhere to play. But not for long.

We were saved by a music visionary. No, not records CEO Barry Weiss '81 of RCA/

the boat by not signing BoB when he had the chance. Instead, the man with a plan was Alumni President **Jarret Wait '80**. Jarrett proposed the band take a chance and reschedule for 2022 Reunion. By then, the COVID wave should have passed and the show could go on. Schedules were checked, plans for an upcoming US summer tour were scrapped (though a fall European tour is still a possibility), and the show was booked. The new schedule allowed more time to hone the set list, but with members scattered from Texas to Georgia, New York to Maine, Boston to Florida, rehearsal was still an issue. New technology would provide a solution of sorts.

Sandy had been using an online service called JamKazam to safely jam with friends during the pandemic. JK is an online environment designed to allow musicians to collaborate over the internet. The boys in the band jumped at the opportunity to rehearse for the first time ever. At least once a week, we got online to work out arrangements, settle on song order, and learn how to play with each other across hundreds of miles. While JK has many drawbacks over in-person rehearsal, it worked well enough to get the job done. We will be more than ready come show time.

BoB's Reunion 2022 lineup is Brian "FinDog" Finneran: vocals, bass; Jay "Sac" Sacco: guitar; Kevin "Krusematic" Kruse: guitar; Dave "D'O" D'Orlando: vocals, guitar, harmonica; Sandy Kraker: vocals, keyboard, flute, harmonica; Howie Gordon:

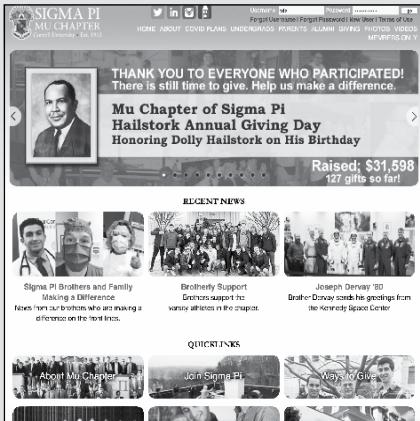
vocals, drums, percussion; Tom Garr: drums, percussion, **William "Biff" Strusz '73**: vocals, guitar. There will be special guest Pi musicians appearing during the show. BoB will play two sets packed full of rock and blues, including classics from the Stones, Dave Mason, Eddie Money, David Bowie,

Darius Rucker, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Pink Floyd, Tom Petty, Traveling Wilburys, and many more.
