As the year winds down, let us look back at all the positives and negatives we have experienced this year. The positives are apparent as you wander within the walls of 730 University

Avenue. The atmosphere is lively; on any given night, you can find brothers socializing in the common spaces or basking in the sun on the beach despite the crisp 60-degree weather. This is all thanks to our commitment to recruitment this past year. When you win in recruitment, you establish a winning culture, which, in turn, drives positive morale. This past recruitment cycle, we brought in 19 new Pi men, 18 first-year students and one sophomore. They come from a wide range of different backgrounds, which was all possible due to the continuous effort of our Rush Chairs Manoc Joa-Griffith '26, Adam Dickstein '26, and Lakshman Sibal '26. With that being said, there were many hiccups along the way, and at some points, it was unclear whether we were ever going to be able to take a spring class.

At the end of the fall semester, we fell into trouble with the Ithaca Fire Department (IFD) following a foam party in our basement. We were cited for improper evacuation protocol and failure to maintain clear walkways for means of egress. In response, the IFD revoked our assembly permit effective immediately and through June 1. The revocation jeopardized our spring recruitment as we were only allowed to have 50 people in our facility at once. With the support of Jarett Wait '80, Jim Franz '77, Liviu Rusu '98, our resident advisor Zion Sherin, and our legal counsel, Liam Murphy, we appealed the revocation to the Ithaca City Building Code Board and had it reversed. It took many hours of manpower to resolve this, but it would not have been possible without continuous alumni support. When our new members signed their bids shortly after this, chaos ensued on campus. On February 9, four fraternities, including Sigma Pi, were suspended indefinitely due to

reports of severe hazing allegations. Again, with the help of our alumni board and by leveraging our relationships with Cornell administrators, we were able to get this resolved over four weeks and continue our new member education process. An additional six chapters were cited and suspended for similar accusations in February. Seemingly, the Cornell interfraternal community is under major scrutiny, and Cornell is essentially covering its tracks to avoid liability. While mitigating risk is understandable, we live on a campus where the interfraternal community is guilty until proven innocent. This is the case across the country on various college campuses. Nevertheless, Sigma Pi remains on the hill as a leader among fraternities. To continue to do so, we must leverage our strong history and reputation while maintaining transparency and strong relations with the Cornell administration.

While the negative experiences of this year are alarming and cause for concern, what concerns me most is how our fraternity chooses to adapt to the ever-changing Cornell climate. The house has grown substantially during my time. Currently, our chapter has around 80 members, the largest I have seen in my four years. With any organization or corporation, there are many questions we must ponder. How do we maintain culture while growing our organization? Do we value stability

over culture? Do we value size over exclusivity? How do we balance stability, culture, and reputation? How do these go hand in hand?

Unfortunately, after four years, I still do not have a clear answer to provide to you. I have learned a lot in my capacity as Sage; one lesson is how to lead a cohort of different individuals toward a common goal. But what happens when our goals may no longer align? What happens when we grow into something so big that it loses sight of its own identity? I am sure many of us have asked ourselves these questions in our personal careers. We all understand that a strong culture can drive stability, but to what extent? The beauty of Sigma Pi is that it is an avenue for us to grow and learn how to be a leader alongside lifelong friends. However, every year, there are new lessons to be learned and unprecedented challenges to tackle. As we navigate the future of Cornell, I have no doubt that Sigma Pi can survive, but I do wonder what we will eventually evolve into in order to do so.

We started the semester on a win. After an incident with the fire department at the end of the fall semester resulting in the assem-

bly permit being revoked through the academic year, the board, sage, and I worked tirelessly to get it overturned before the start of the semester and we were successful. With less than a 24-hour notice, and during move-in, the house had to prepare for our assembly inspection, and we passed which allowed the brothers to conduct rush at the house.

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Alumni/E-Board Resolve IFD Citation

On a Thursday evening prior to Thanksgiving break, the undergraduate brothers had a "foam party" with about 60–70 people in attendance. During the party, close to midnight, the

foam machine, adjacent to a fire detector, apparently set off the fire alarm. Sigma Pi Resident Advisor **Zion Sherin** saw what happened and knowing what caused it, turned off the alarm.

Unfortunately, this was the wrong, vet understandable, response. Everyone at the house evacuated when the Ithaca Fire Department (IFD) arrived at 730 University Avenue. Three firemen entered the house, met with the RA and sage, conducted an inspection, and inquired as to why was the alarm turned off. Zion proactively spoke to the IFD officers about his mistake in silencing the alarm and accepted responsibility. The IFD representatives proceeded to chaste Zion for silencing the alarm, but nonetheless appreciated him owning up to his mistake. The IFD crew then gave the "all clear" signal to permit people to reenter the house. Much to everyone's surprise, a short while later, a senior IFD official arrived at the house and was irate that the alarm had been silenced. In his eyes, the house was not evacuated. The official's interaction was confusing and unnecessarily confrontational with our sage and RA. The IFD subsequently cited Mu Chapter for turning off the alarm, not properly evacuating the premises, obstructing entrances and hallways, and hindering an IFD investigation. This resulted in the IFD revoking Sigma Pi's assembly permit through June 1, which placed January recruitment and all spring social functions in peril.

An emergency leadership team quickly came together consisting of Jarett Wait '80, Liviu Rusu '98, Jim Franz '77, Zion Sherin, and Sage Rob de Jesus '24. The group moved to quickly hire a savvy attorney to represent us and file an appeal with the Town of Ithaca for a hearing to overturn this unfair and arbitrary citation. The team conducted a thorough investigation reviewing security footage, interviewing brothers, etc. After a three-hour hearing on January

16 (three days before the start of rush) the Town Board voted 3-0 to overturn the IFD action and subsequently gave the IFD a verbal rebuke in front of the Mu Chapter team. The next day, a new crew from IFD conducted a fire safety inspection whereby our assembly permit was formally reinstated just in time for recruitment!

As an outgrowth of this incident, Mu Chapter has developed and implemented a new set of fire and safety procedures and rules. This was an unbelievable result in the face of many obstacles in a short timeframe and is a testament to the spirit of partnership between the alumni and executive board. Jevo!!!

Brothers Awarded IFC Grants

Alumni Treasurer Report

Greetings from a typically rainy spring day on the lake north of Ithaca!

As is detailed in other parts of this *Muse*, it has been an active and interesting few months as we have had repeated challenges and have found ourselves needing to increase spending

across multiple lines of purchased goods and services. That said, and despite running deficits (expenses exceed collections), we are current on all our bills and we are likely to remain so in the foreseeable future. Moreover, we have begun to take steps to "re-imagine" Sigma Pi Mu Chapter as a house that is attractive to many future generations of Cornell undergraduates whose needs and interests will likely differ from those that made Mu Chapter attractive in the past. So, despite the challenges, it is an exciting time at 730 University Avenue!

Thanks to the heroic efforts (and raw skill) of guitarist and vocalist extraordinaire **Dave D'Orlando '79**, we were able to secure new liability insurance policies despite the lack of competition in the market. Insurance has been one of the fastest-growing line items on our income statement for the past four years. Without insurance, it would be simply impossible to operate a fraternity. But the rise in costs is straining our budget. It may soon be necessary to add an "insurance"

surcharge" to our rent bills in order to recover the rapid rise in premiums and allow us to make adjustments independent of the Cornell dorm rates which are the foundation for rent in today's Mu Chapter budget model.

Taxes are another significant line item that is increasing, albeit not as rapidly as insurance. Real estate taxes (city and school) total over \$46,000 per year and are likely to increase along with the value of the house and the inflationary forces affecting city services. In just the last four years, our spending on supplies and maintenance has increased by 43% to more than \$42,000 for the current year. And there is a long list of projects in the hopper that John Morrison '75 and Liviu Rusu '98 would like us to fund now to keep ahead of the ordinary abuse that happens in a college fraternity house.

We continue to struggle to get ahead of the slow payment


problems that became our issue when Cornell ended fraternity access to its Bursar billing system. It has required a significant increase in time and effort, as well as money spent on outside services. We are paying increased amounts to our accounting firm to prepare the information we need to manage delinquent accounts. We are transitioning from relying primarily on the undergraduate treasurer to keep bill payments visible to all undergraduate members to a 30-60-90 system owned by our business partner, Elevate. We have also ramped up our communication with parents, describing the difficulty we face when bills are not paid when due. In some cases, communication is all that is needed, but sadly not in all cases.

There is good news on the near horizon. The undergraduates have managed substantial gains in pledge class size in the last two cycles, and house occupancy (the primary driver of revenue) is slated to increase in the 2024–2025 academic year. But with increased occupancy will come the need to purchase more beds and furniture, and maintenance costs are correlated with the number of members living in the house. The net, however, should be a positive increase in cash flow to help mitigate the inflationary pressures. We hope this increased occupancy can be sustained.

I am looking forward to seeing many of you for the nowannual reunion celebration in June. I would also like to again ask for your (continued) generosity to Sigma Pi Mu

> Chapter. Gifts to the alumni corporation, while not taxdeductible, help to close the gaps created by inflation and slow payment of some student bills. Every dollar contributed to the alumni corporation is invested in the operation of the house. If it has been a while since you contributed, now would be a good time to do so. And of course, there is also the Educational Foundation, where donations are tax-deductible. and they have been helping an increasing number of our younger brothers meet their financial obligations to the fraternity. As always, thank you for your generosity.

If you are planning to be on campus, send me a note. I have transitioned to "half-time," so you are much more likely to find me on or near campus in the fall semester, but reach out any time.



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Re-imagine Sigma Pi Facilities Campaign

I practice construction, fly hang gliders, and think insurance is for pessimists.

So, what keeps me up at night, given this level of risk tolerance? Only two

thoughts: window air conditioner units falling out of windows at the Pi house and an earthquake in Ithaca making the house cave in along the bathroom stack. Two AC units have already fallen out of windows in prior years and a 4.8 magnitude earthquake hit 40 miles west of NYC on April 5, 2024. I was working on the second-floor bathroom, and when

add To some appropriate context. we must start in 1994. the fire. after The house was rebuilt in a rush. Mistakes

made. The plumber, trying to get his toilet piping down through the wall, cut away at the triple beam in his way, cutting through two of the three individual beams. "See, no big deal," I'm pretty sure he thought to himself afterward, with the structure still standing. But that was before the two-inch concrete slab was poured to give the bathroom floor a slope to the floor drain. That was before time slowly worked to sag the remaining beam. It became noticeable to the naked eye about 10 years ago. Concerned, we had an architect and contractor team open the wall between the bathroom and hallway and inspect the area, revealing nothing. The sagging continued, causing the wax toilet seals to leak, seeping water through the wood and compounding the problem. And one day the first-floor bathroom ceiling fell off; the sheetrock waterlogged. With the ceiling open, the cause of the problem was now evident. And so was additional damage: the rot to the remaining structure. That was a year ago and we placed "the beam" on "the ever-growing

list" of projects to address when money

allows. This year, the second-floor bathroom ceiling fell off, the sheetrock waterlogged from a toilet leak above it. With the ceiling open, the growth of the problem was now evident, it wasn't just one triple beam compromised, but two right on top of one another, meaning the lower beam is carrying two concrete slabs and failing at an increasing rate. There's now a distinct and regular popping sound that's perceptible in the quiet of the night. Sagging is not a continuous process, but a stepped one, each step having this unique audio signature.

So, this is the context in which I ran out of the Pi house when my phone received an earthquake alert. Currently,

> scrambling to install temporary shoring on each side of each beam so I can soundly. sleep without ries about earthquakes in Ithaca.

> What was once important, not urgent, has become urgent.

Will we have an earthquake in Ithaca? Maybe. Will we have a safety inspection? Definitely! Having an AC unit in the hallway led to losing our assembly permit and cost us \$30,000 in legal fees to reinstate it. Losing our occupancy permit would be much more expensive. And the underlying problem must be addressed

regardless. But who's to pay? We're past the statute of limitations for holding builder or the plumber accountable, and the cost of these renovations is substantial. We have a full house slated for next semester and a forecast

budget surplus for the first time in four years, but that's not enough.

This is where we, as alumni, come into play. The Pi house not only serves as a residence for our younger brothers, but also stands as a testament to our shared history and our commitment to the future of Sigma Pi at Cornell. Every donation, whether large or small, will contribute toward preserving the house for future generations of Sigma Pi brothers.

In addition to financial contributions, we welcome any expertise our alumni network can offer. Whether you have experience in construction, engineering, legal, or fundraising, your involvement can make a significant difference. I truly believe that by pooling our resources and expertise, we can overcome these challenges and emerge stronger; as we have done repeatedly before.

Our immediate priority is to secure the structural integrity of the building. This necessitates removing the concrete slabs in the bathrooms, which are dead weight, replacing the compromised beams and re-routing the plumbing stack, then refinishing the bathroom floors. The second priority, and almost as important, is a solution to window AC units. For over a year, the facilities committee has been evaluating and debating various systems and their pros and cons with a focus on long-term solutions rather than quick fixes. But our list also includes many other important and urgent items, like all the door locks, for which we can no longer source components, and which require new doors to properly address, bedroom floors that need refinishing after 30 years, a front porch with compromised concrete tiles and a leak into the dining room, a grab-and-go area

> that needs to be more of a kitchen to meet the actual use scenario. and more.

together can we ensure that our chapter house remains a safe and proud home for many more years to

come. Let's rise to the challenge and keep the spirit of Sigma Pi Mu Chapter strong at Cornell.

Mu Chapter Legal Entity Review

Officers and directors of the alumni board had a meeting recently with the Grand Sage and CEO of Sigma Pi Fraternity, International to discuss the need to reorganize our undergraduate chapter, house and property, and alumni organization's legal entity status to limit potential liability due to unforeseen risks, etc.

All of the fraternity's activities, members (undergraduates and alumn), and assets (house and property) are currently all under one legal entity.

Sigma Pi Fraternity, International recommends we consider creating three separate legal entities:

- Undergraduate Chapter
- Alumni Housing Corp (house and property included) separate board
- Become a chartered Sigma Pi Alumni Association – separate board

In the spring of 2020, Mu Chapter filed a petition to form the Mu Chapter Cornell University Alumni Association. SPI Grand Council approved the chartering of the alumni association back in 2020 right around the same time COVID hit. During that time there was a lot of transition at SPI and our application was lost. Thankfully during this review, the application was found and has been subsequently approved.

The purpose of the Mu Chapter Cornell University Alumni Association is to serve as a network for any Mu Chapter alumni and provide support to the undergraduate chapter.

The alumni board, led by **Peter Muth '74**, has started a small working group to examine what next steps are to be taken to establish the other legal entities highlighted above. This will obviously take some time and ultimately will need to be reflected in our brotherhood membership agreements, tax filings, etc. We hope to wrap this up in a few months so we can have new agreements for the 2024–2025 academic year and have a structure that reflects prudent risk management going forward.

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Risk Management Education, Process and Coverage

Risk management is a very important part of our operation at Mu Chapter



of Sigma Pi. We have monthly safety inspections of our fraternity and annual education sessions with our undergraduate brothers to prevent incidents. We also

have property, general liability, worker's compensation, and directors' and officers' liability insurance to help protect us in the event of a covered loss or incident.

This year, our April 1 insurance renewal was far more challenging than normal. Market factors such as large rate increases and new coverage exclusions made it necessary for us to explore other options. After several years of double-digit rate increases, we were able to obtain coverage at a reasonably competitive price but with new conditions, limitations, and exclusions. The cost to

protect our fraternity through insurance has now reached over \$43,000 a year, which is one of our largest expenses. This cost has doubled in the last four years. This year's renewal process has underscored the need for us to be vigilant in loss control so that we are never in a bad position to receive an insurance offer for renewal.

It is important that the brotherhood abide by all the policies and procedures in the chapter handbook to ensure fire safety and to prevent other forms of property damage. It is also important that there not be any personal injury on the premises or at any off-premises fraternity function. Safety is the number one priority. Our insurance provides very little coverage for hazing, alcohol-related incidents, assault and battery, sexual harassment, and any form of discrimination.

Thank you to all the alumni board members, fraternity officers, and undergraduate brothers for their efforts in maintaining the physical

integrity of the fraternity house and for their diligence in preventing unfortunate events.

At the start of the semester, Liam Murphy, a local Ithaca lawyer, gave the Sigma Pi brotherhood a presentation titled, "When Bad Things Happen, the World Takes Notice!" The presentation focused on liability, both personal and group, with a specific focus on:

- What liability is
- Differences between group and personal liability
- How group liability can impact individuals
- Resources the brothers have to be responsible and avoid liability

The discussion emphasized the role of safety and abiding by sound policies and procedures with a focus on the result of not taking responsibility.


